Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, It is a blessing and an honor to serve you Saints here at Zion and Christ the King Lutheran churches. As we continue in the Church season of Easter, we hear in our readings the progression of Christ's earthly appearances and interactions after the Easter resurrection. There were many and varied reactions to the hearing and seeing of the risen Christ. We hear of Mary Magdalene, Joanna, and Mary the mother of James who reported to the apostles that they had spoken with Jesus, but "the (apostles) did not believe them." (Luke 24:26) On the road to Emmaus two disciples walked with Jesus but at first, they didn't recognize Him, until they walked a distance with Him. St. Thomas was not at first convinced, and other apostles were startled as the resurrected Jesus walked into a closed room and then spoke and ate with them.

The common denominator for these encounters with the risen Christ was that a change had occurred. Even with Jesus' interacting and teaching about what would happen and what had to happen. His death and resurrection was an unsettling change for the followers of Christ. Yet, as we read further along in the book of Acts, Jesus continued to appear to the apostles and He was, "speaking about the kingdom of God." (Acts 1:3) Jesus continues to teach, telling the apostles their mission was to be "witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8) Throughout the book of Acts, we hear how this mission of witnessing was taken seriously. Even in a world which was in opposition to the apostles they continued to share the Good News of Jesus

Christ as they were, "every day, in the temple and from house to house, they did not cease teaching and preaching that the Christ is Jesus." (Acts 5:42) The proclamation went out from Jerusalem to many and varied places as the apostles interacted with their communities. St. Paul and many others also shared the Word further and further, and so we hear, "the Word of the Lord continued to increase and prevail mightily." (Acts 19:20)

You, the Saints of Zion and Christ the King, are experiencing changes in your leadership as your beloved under-shepherd is called to a new ministry and as you await a new under-shepherd to arrive. It is comforting to know that while our current reality may make us seem uneasy, our Lord Jesus Christ is always Lord of the Church. As your shepherd Jesus hears your prayers, He knows your every thought, and He cares for you. The name of your next pastor is already known by God and God will deliver him here to you, to proclaim His Word and administer His sacraments. In fact, in this time, you are not without a shepherd, Jesus, "is with you always even to the end of the age." (Mt. 28:19) So, in what may seem to be an in-between time, it is well for us to recall the words which Jesus spoke to His apostles apply to us as well. Because Christ has won our salvation, we who await His glorious return are to continue forward, our mission is ongoing, "witnessing...to the ends of the earth." We are called to be witnesses of Christ in every vocation we may have, we witness in Word and Sacrament ministry, we witness as the Easter proclamation continues, and we witness as we gather together in parish planning meetings, Bible studies, and the many other opportunities to gather in fellowship. Indeed, in all

our interactions and gatherings, "the Word of the Lord continues to increase and prevail mightily." (Acts 19:20)

Though it may be easy for us to be frightened or startled by the change in our lives, in our church, and in our world, we can all be comforted by the constant love of Jesus Christ. Please join us in the many opportunities we offer as we continue to move forward together in Christ.

More Than a Negative

Even if you've never had to testify in court, a thousand TV shows have made you familiar with the question, "Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?" Why not just make people swear to tell the truth? Or make them promise not to lie?

Any parent who has ever had to interrogate a child about a broken cookie jar or a scuffle over a toy knows the answer. There are plenty of ways to try to get out of trouble without technically lying. You tell just enough of the truth to skate on by.

We often play the game of seeing how close we can get to sinning without technically going over the line.

But in our heart of hearts we know that this is not

what God intended when He gave us the commandments. He's not giving us a merely negative rule and challenging us to just barely stay away from this or that. There is much more to each commandment than a prohibition. We shouldn't just avoid murdering people — we should be of service to our neighbor. For each negative prohibition in the commandments there is a positive good that we are to cherish and protect. In the Eighth Commandment, that gift is the reputation of our neighbor and our relationship with him: You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.


What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

Your relationship with your family members (who are your nearest neighbors), the other members of your congregation, your coworkers, and your friends is one of the most precious gifts you have been given. You need to exercise good stewardship with this gift just as much as you need to exercise good stewardship with your life, resources, time and income. This is an especially

fragile gift because it's easy to ruin a relationship with slander and talking behind someone's back. But speaking well of your neighbor in Christian love is absolutely free; it costs you nothing, yet it pays you great dividends. If you find this challenging at times, if you are tempted to speak ill of others, just remember that this other person is also a beloved child of God for whom your Lord Jesus suffered and died. Your Lord Jesus loves you both.

NURSE'S NOTE: We all have been touched by cancer. We have had cancer or we know someone who has cancer, or someone who died from it. This is part 3 of a 3-part series on understanding mutation of cells, risk factors, and prevention of cancer. The following information was taken from the Mayo Clinic website for disease and conditions.

Isaiah 40:31 "they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint."

Complications Cancer and its treatment can cause several complications, including:

- ●Pain. Pain can be caused by cancer or by cancer treatment, though not all cancer is painful. Medications and other approaches can effectively treat cancer-related pain.
- Fatigue. Fatigue in people with cancer has many causes, but it can often be managed. Fatigue associated with chemotherapy or radiation therapy treatments is common, but it's usually temporary.
- Difficulty breathing. Cancer or cancer treatment may cause a feeling of being short of breath. Treatments may bring relief.
- ●Nausea. Certain cancers and cancer treatments can cause nausea. Your doctor can sometimes predict if your treatment is likely to cause nausea. Medications and other treatments may help you prevent or decrease nausea.
- Diarrhea or constipation. Cancer and cancer treatment can affect your bowels and cause diarrhea or constipation.
- ●Weight loss. Cancer and cancer treatment may cause weight loss. Cancer steals food from normal cells and deprives them of nutrients. This is often not affected by how many calories or what kind of food is eaten; it's difficult to treat. In most cases, using artificial nutrition through tubes into the stomach or vein does not help change the weight loss.
- ●Chemical changes in your body. Cancer can upset the normal chemical balance in your body and increase your risk of serious complications. Signs and symptoms of chemical imbalances might include excessive thirst, frequent urination, constipation and confusion.
- ●Brain and nervous system problems. Cancer can press on nearby nerves and cause pain and loss of function of one part of your body.

Cancer that involves the brain can cause headaches and stroke-like signs and symptoms, such as weakness on one side of your body.

- •Unusual immune system reactions to cancer. In some cases the body's immune system may react to the presence of cancer by attacking healthy cells. Called paraneoplastic syndromes, these very rare reactions can lead to a variety of signs and symptoms, such as difficulty walking and seizures.
- ●Cancer that spreads. As cancer advances, it may spread (metastasize) to other parts of the body. Where cancer spreads depends on the type of cancer.
- ●Cancer that returns. Cancer survivors have a risk of cancer recurrence. Some cancers are more likely to recur than others. Ask your doctor about what you can do to reduce your risk of cancer recurrence. Your doctor may devise a follow-up care plan for you after treatment. This plan may include periodic scans and exams in the months and years after your treatment, to look for cancer recurrence.

Prevention

Doctors have identified several ways to reduce your risk of cancer, such as:

- ●Stop smoking. If you smoke, quit. If you don't smoke, don't start. Smoking is linked to several types of cancer —not just lung cancer. Stopping now will reduce your risk of cancer in the future.
- Avoid excessive sun exposure. Harmful ultraviolet (UV) rays from the sun can increase your risk of skin cancer. Limit your sun exposure by staying in the shade, wearing protective clothing or applying sunscreen.
- ●Eat a healthy diet. Choose a diet rich in fruits and vegetables. Select whole grains and lean proteins. Limit your intake of processed meats.
- ●Exercise most days of the week. Regular exercise is linked to a lower risk of cancer. Aim for at least 30 minutes of exercise most days of the week. If you haven't been exercising regularly, start out slowly and work your way up to 30 minutes or longer.
- ●Maintain a healthy weight. Being overweight or obese may increase your risk of cancer. Work to achieve and maintain a healthy weight through a combination of a healthy diet and regular exercise.
- ●Drink alcohol in moderation, if you choose to drink. If you choose to drink alcohol, do so in moderation. For healthy adults, that means up to one drink a day for women and up to two drinks a day for men.

●Schedule cancer screening exams. Talk to your doctor about what types of cancer screening exams are best for you based on your risk factors.

● Ask your doctor about immunizations.

Certain viruses increase your risk of cancer. Immunizations may help prevent those viruses, including hepatitis B, which increases the risk of liver cancer, and human papillomavirus (HPV), which increases the risk of cervical cancer and other cancers. Ask your doctor whether immunization against these viruses is appropriate for you. I hope you have found this 3 part series informative. Of course this is just skimming the surface when it comes to information and knowledge of cancer. Please, if you have concerns speak to your health care provider. Time is alway of the essence!
